## Youth "Field Day" held at Club Grounds

Every spring the Education Committee has the pleasure of working with the youth in the Coon Valley-Chaseburg schools to help them learn more about conservation of our natural resources. There are a couple of ways we as a club, attempt to accomplish this. We have an annual "Field Day" down on the farm, for the 7th grade class, and we also sponsor 2 students, from the 7th grade class to attend a summer camp at the Central Wisconsin Environmental Station.

Our Field Day was held on May 10th and the weatherman smiled on us with a beautiful day. Jim Dalton, the Vernon County Forester and Dave Mathis, the county wildlife manager, were both able to attend to help us explain some of the projects the club is doing and why.

The class showed up around noon and the kids unloaded off the bus where they were they are treated to hot dogs, beans, chips, and pop. This year, as in the past couple, the feast was whipped up by Chef Al Haakenson, and the kids cleaned up almost everything we cooked up. (Al played hooky from work but don't tell anyone) We then start our tour of the farm. We went as one group this year because of a bus scheduling problem where the class had to leave about ½ hour earlier than usual. The class was shown the trout rearing tanks, wildlife feed plots, our tree plantation and the clear cut. We showed them the difference in growth from the trees started from seedlings, versus the ones that used an existing root system to get started. (for those of you who haven't been able to see the difference in person, many of the trees that started from the existing root systems in the clear cut area are now 15+ feet tall and the tallest ones in the plantation are a maximum height of 8 feet) We showed them how to age trees and explained a little about our farms history with the CCC practices. The terraces, locust trees, and scotch pine are all great examples of some

## Wildlife Habitat Improvements

In April, 300 shrubs and trees were planted on club property. The plants were ordered through the Trempealeau County Land Conservation Department. The plants came at a reduced price as part of a state-run habitat improvement program. Four different types of plant were purchased. They include wild plum, ninebark, arrowwood viburnum, and silky dogwood. Wild plum and ninebark provide excellent nesting habitat for songbirds and cover for small mammals. Ninebark also makes an excellent hedge or shrub border. For this reason, a strip of ninebark was planted between the clubhouse and the farmhouse to provide some privacy to the renters. Arrowwood viburnum has a blue-black fruit that attracts birds, squirrels, and deer. It also has a beautiful glossy red fall foliage. Silky dogwood also has a red fall foliage. The buds and berries of silky dogwood attract birds while deer and squirrels browse on the stems and leaves. John Moe, Brandon Wehling, and Colin Sveum (+ 2 friends from work) helped to plant the trees and shrubs. The abundant moisture this summer has resulted in good growth of these shrubs and trees. Hopefully the plants will grow quickly and provide wildlife the food and cover they require. If anyone is interested in ordering plants through the Trempealeau County Land Conservation Department please contact Colin Sveum at 787-6170.

Two corn food plots were again planted on the property. This corn is not harvested and is consumed primarily by deer, wild turkey, and birds in late winter when food resources are limited. Tom Mathison and Charles Sveum again volunteered to plant and care for these food plots. Thank them when you get a chance. Each year the club strives to make their property better for the wildlife that call it home.

## TROUT REARING UPDATE

In mid-June, the club received 2,000 wild brook trout continuing the club's commitment towards improving trout fishing in our local streams. These fish are considered "wild" because they are offspring of wild fish that were captured from local streams. This differs from trout the club raised and released in the past. The trout raised by the club in the past were offspring of parent fish born and raised in a hatchery. Hatchery trout generally are tame. Wild trout are generally more wary and should be less susceptible to early mortality. These trout should provide fisherman with a greater fishing challenge. It is expected that "wild" trout will exhibit the survival skills needed to thrive in our area streams.

So far this years batch of brook trout are doing extremely well. They are growing quickly and only a handful have died. Feeding and cleaning duties this year are the charge of John Griffin (check spelling) and Charles Sveum. Thanks guys for your efforts! This year the club expected an additional 1,000 wild brown trout but due to unexpected needs from rearing facilities in north-eastern Wisconsin, no extra trout were available. Bu next spring, just prior to the May opener, the brook trout will be released into tributaries of the Coon Creek. By then the trout will have grown from there current size (2-3 inches) to around 10 inches. A few brook trout will also end up in the club's pond. These fish will add to the population of trout already in the pond. Kids that come to the August chicken-que are welcome to fish in the pond. So bring the kids and fish poles August 13th!



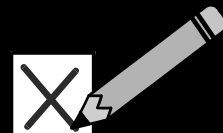
## DEER HUNT FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES 2000

For the 4th consecutive year, the Coon Valley Conservation Club will hold a gun deer hunt for hunters with disabilities. The hunt will be held from October 7th through the 15th. For the second year, the club's and Jon Larson's bordering properties will be open for this hunt (nearly 350 acres). Persons eligible for this hunt must have a Class A or C hunter permit number. Hunt participants and their designated assistant(s) need to contact me before the September 1st deadline. Remember that all regulations and weapons used during this hunt will be the same as during the regular gun deer season in November.

During the first 3 years the club has held this hunt, an average of 2 to 3 participants have signed up annually. Two bucks have been harvested (1 in 1997 and 1 last year). Hunting pressure has been light and the club would like to get more disabled hunter participation. Therefore, if you know of anyone that may be interested please let me know before the September 1st deadline (ask for Colin at 608-787-6170). Two hunters are currently signed up to hunt. The hunt lists for each property are made on a first-come first-served basis.

Club members need to remember that during the hunt, only the participants and their designated assistants(s) may hunt on either the club's or Jon Larson's property. Both properties will be clearly posted during the hunt. Club members also need to be aware that both the bow and shooting ranges will be closed during the 9 day season (7-15 October). Hopefully the hunt participants will enjoy a safe, peaceful, and successful hunt.
